This literature review explains how the concept of therapy dogs and reading skill development in children works. Researchers have identified several positive outcomes when bringing dogs into this process. The documented effects on reading behavior include:

- · Reduced reading anxiety
- Greater reading confidence
- Increased reading motivation
- Improved reading attitude
- Improved self-esteem

While evidence is compelling, more rigorous research is recommended and ongoing. Many anecdotal accounts exist. Organizations such as Intermountain Therapy Animals have shown that therapy dogs can make a difference. The interaction between a therapy dog and a child has the potential for profound positive impact in encouraging reading development in children. It starts with an interaction that avoids judgment and guarantees unconditional acceptance.
